Menards, Home Depot, or Lowe's:

- -Arm and Hammer Washing Soda used in cooking plant material. Soda Ash is considered mild, but it is a caustic and requires careful handling. All alkali chemicals should be added to water, never add water to an alkali as spattering can occur; wear eye protection. It rarely irritates the skin, but can cause drying and cracking; wear rubber gloves.
- -Hard Maple fiber beating stick or meat tenderizer
- -Plywood for expelling paper and for fiber beating surface
- -Cement mixing tubs for vat or other container
- -Hardware cloth, wood stapler, screen, duct tape, weather stripping for home-made mould and deckle
- -Sponges
- -Buckets
- -Fiberglass window screen (aka mosquito netting) for straining material or for creating watermarks

Also Useful:

- -Containers with lids for storing batches of wet material
- -Sketchbook or log
- -Scissors
- -"Pellon" or interfacing fabric.
- -heavy duty rubber gloves
- -goggles
- -Colander, strainer, Mosquito netting or nylon mesh (from Carriage House Paper)
- -Wooden spoon with long handle or dowel for cooking plants
- -Blender or drill with paint mixer attachment
- -Enamel or stainless steel stock pot (NOT aluminum)

HOW TO TELL WHETHER IT'S ALUMINUM

- -Aluminum sounds duller and has less of a ring than stainless steel. Rap your knuckles on the edge of the pot or bang it with a wooden spoon.
- -Aluminum feels slightly warmer than stainless steel at room temperature.
- -After being washed, aluminum tends to dull slightly, while stainless steel usually stays bright.
- -Because aluminum is softer than stainless steel, a key will scratch aluminum much more readily than stainless steel.
- -If a magnet sticks to the side of the pot (even weakly), it is definitely stainless steel and not aluminum. (Note: If a magnet does not stick, you still can't tell which metal it is, but you can be sure it's stainless steel if the magnet does stick!)

<u>Useful Items for a Range of Techniques:</u>

- -blotting paper
- -Pieces of cardboard (the heavy duty kind is best)
- -Pieces of window screen or mosquito netting
- -Wool army blankets that can be cut up and used instead of pellons
- -Hot pot holder or mitt
- -clothing that can get wet/messy and/or plastic apron and rubber boots
- -Flexible wire or basketmaking reed
- -plastic squeeze bottles
- -Spray bottles
- -Sewing hoop (optional)
- -brightly colored spool of string or thread
- -plastic table covering
- -frozen okra
- -fan to aid in restraint drying
- -portable gas burner if you want to cook outside
